State Propositions

Proposition 1

RECOMMENDED NO VOTE

BONDS TO FUND SPECIFIED HOUSING ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS.

Authorizes \$4 billion in general obligation bonds for existing affordable housing programs for low-income residents, veterans, farmworkers, manufactured and mobile homes, infill, and transit-oriented housing. Fiscal Impact: Increased state costs to repay bonds averaging about \$170 million annually over the next 35 years.

Bond's are not sustainable solutions. Housing is a problem that can not be solved with a bond or by raising taxes. This housing bond will assure that more families can not afford to live in California. The best housing solutions come from organizations

Proposition 2

RECOMMENDED NO VOTE

BONDS TO FUND EXISTING HOUSING PROGRAM FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH MENTAL ILLNESS. Amends Mental Health Services Act to fund No Place Like Home Program, which finances housing for individuals with mental illness. Ratifies existing law establishing the No Place Like Home Program. Fiscal Impact: Allows the state to use up to \$140 million per year of county mental health funds to repay up to \$2 billion in bonds. These bonds would fund housing for those with mental illness who are homeless

This bond relies heavily on the top 1% of income earners and, more with more volatility, the economy. Mental health issues require stability. As the Democrats increase their challenge the President, the California economic stability becomes less predictable and risk the sudden removal or funding cut of critical services.

Proposition 3

RECOMMENDED NO VOTE

BONDS TO FUND PROJECTS FOR WATER SUPPLY AND QUALITY, WATERSHED, FISH, WILDLIFE, WATER CONVEYANCE, AND GROUNDWATER SUSTAINABILITY AND STORAGE. INITIATIVE

STATUTE. Authorizes \$8.877 billion in state general obligation bonds for various infrastructure projects. Fiscal Impact: Increased state costs to repay bonds averaging \$430 million per year over 40 years. Local government savings for water-related projects, likely averaging a couple hundred million dollars annually over the next few decades.

Since 2006 there has been \$20.478 billion in bonds approved for water infrastructure and according to the State Treasurer in August 2018 there are still \$7.1 billion in bonds that haven't been issued. There have been no notable improvements in that time period with money still available, and there is no reason that the State of California should be saddled with another \$8.877 billion in unfunded liabilities.



BONDS FUNDING CONSTRUCTION AT HOSPITALS PROVIDING CHILDREN'S HEALTH CARE. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Authorizes \$1.5 billion in bonds, to be repaid from state's General Fund, to fund grants for construction, expansion, renovation, and equipping of qualifying children's hospitals. Fiscal Impact: Increased state costs to repay bonds averaging about \$80 million annually over the next 35 years.

Our children hospitals are a top priority. Which is exactly why billionaires, like Benioff and Zuckerberg, have donated billions to children hospitals across the state, willingly. The state does not need to burden the middle class and struggling families with an additional tax; especially when the money provided by private donors enables hospitals to control the money more wisely then the state could or with the un accountability of the states general fund.

CHANGES REQUIREMENTS FOR CERTAIN PROPERTY OWNERS TO TRANSFER THEIR PROPERTY TAX BASE TO REPLACEMENT

PROPERTY. Removes certain transfer requirements for homeowners over 55, severely disabled homeowners, and contaminated or disaster-destroyed property. Fiscal Impact: Schools and local governments each would lose over \$100 million in annual property taxes early on, growing to about \$1 billion per year. Similar increase in state costs to backfill school property tax losses.

This proposition, the Property Tax Fairness Initiative, eliminates the "moving penalty" that exists today in order to protect seniors (55+) and severely disabled people who want to move to safer, more practical homes or closer to their families. Encouraging moving and downsizing will encourage a more active and free housing market.

ELIMINATES CERTAIN ROAD REPAIR AND TRANSPORTATION FUNDING. REQUIRES CERTAIN FUEL TAXES AND VEHICLE FEES BE APPROVED BY THE ELECTORATE. Repeals a 2017 transportation law's taxes and fees designated for road repairs and public transportation. Fiscal Impact: Reduced ongoing revenues of \$5.1 billion from state fuel and vehicle taxes that mainly would have paid for highway and road maintenance and repairs, as well as transit programs.

If pre-existing transportation taxes and fees were spent on transportation costs (as they should be), California would have \$5.6 Billion annually for transportation projects. The money is there its just not being spent well. Demand accountability and ensure major gas taxes have to go before the voters.

RECOMMENDED YES VOTE

CONFORMS CALIFORNIA DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME TO FEDERAL LAW. ALLOWS LEGISLATURE TO CHANGE DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME PERIOD.

Gives Legislature ability to change daylight saving time period by twothirds vote, if changes are consistent with federal law. Changes to daylight saving time would depend on future actions by the Legislature and potentially the federal government.

Daylight saving time (DST) as an "outdated practice. Opponents want the world to revolve around them. Get the government out of mother nature and allow for humans and business to operate during the daylight hours they choose to.

Proposition 8

RECOMMENDED NO VOTE

REGULATES AMOUNTS OUTPATIENT KIDNEY DIALYSIS CLINICS CHARGE FOR DIALYSIS TREATMENT. Requires rebates and penalties if charges exceed limit. Requires annual reporting to the state. Prohibits clinics from refusing to treat patients based on payment source. Fiscal Impact: Overall annual effect on state and local governments ranging from net positive impact in the low tens of millions of dollars to net negative impact in the tens of millions of dollars.

Why are California voters being asked to weigh in on something that should be between patients, their families and their doctors? Dialysis should be widely available to meet the wide variety and complex needs that face these patients. Prop 8 aims to limit the market and reduce clinics. Put patients before unions and note no.

Proposition 9

Proposition 9 was removed from the ballot by order of the California Supreme Court.



EXPANDS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS' AUTHORITY TO ENACT RENT CONTROL ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY. I Repeals state law that currently restricts the scope of rent-control policies that cities and other local jurisdictions may impose on residential property. Fiscal Impact: Potential net reduction in state and local revenues of tens of millions of dollars per year in the long term. Depending on actions by local communities, revenue losses could be less or considerably more. REQUIRES PRIVATE-SECTOR

Rent control laws reduce the amount of rental property available because landlords will stop renting and does not encourage more building. This proposition will expand rent controlled property inventory. Without a plan to help families progress out of rent control we should not be increasing the population of people who are not able to keep up with the cost of living.

EMERGENCY AMBULANCE EMPLOYEES TO REMAIN ONCALL DURING WORK BREAKS. ELIMINATES CERTAIN EMPLOYER LIABILITY.

Law entitling hourly employees to breaks without being on-call would not apply to private-sector ambulance employees. Fiscal Impact: Likely fiscal benefit to local governments (in the form of lower costs and higher revenues), potentially in the tens of millions of dollars each year.

Work contracts should be between the employee and the employer. What might be good for one large metropolitan Ambulances won't always be what's best for small towns. Taxpayers

RESTABLISHES NEW STANDARDS FOR CONFINEMENT OF SPECIFIED FARM ANIMALS; BANS SALE OF NONCOMPLYING PRODUCTS

Establishes minimum requirements for confining certain farm animals. Prohibits sales of meat and egg products from animals confined in noncomplying manner. Fiscal Impact: Potential decrease in state income tax revenues from farm businesses, likely not more than several million dollars annually. State costs up to \$10 million annually to enforce the measure

County of Santa Clara Sales Tax Increase (continuation)

Palo Alto Unified School District School Bond

Luther Burbank School District School Bond

When the top 1% of taxpayers have already overfunded school improvement funds, you should not be on the hook to pay for rebuilding the front office of this one site school district.
